# Unveiling the Conflict of the Speed of Light Postulate: Outlined Mathematical Refutation of the Special Relativity 

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#### Abstract

This paper reveals the mathematical contradictory aspects of Einstein's speed of light postulate and the Lorentz transformation (LT) equations. Essential analyses of the equations, leading to the intelligible refutation of the mathematical foundation of the Special Relativity Theory (SRT), are emphasized in an outlined structure.


## Introduction

The e-print [http://vixra.org/abs/1306.0098](http://vixra.org/abs/1306.0098), by the author, is a formal dissertation on LT and SRT, dealing with the mathematical and theoretical inconsistencies of the speed of light principle and the LT equations. This communication just outlines the performed mathematical deductions, prominently leading to the refutation of the SRT.

## Lorentz Transformation

Consider two inertial frames of reference, $K(x, y, z, t)$ and $K^{\prime}\left(x^{\prime}, y^{\prime}, z^{\prime}, t^{\prime}\right)$, in translational relative motion with speed $v$.

## LT equations [1-3]:

$$
\begin{gather*}
x^{\prime}=\gamma(x-v t) \\
t^{\prime}=\gamma\left(t-\frac{v x}{c^{2}}\right)  \tag{1}\\
x=\gamma\left(x^{\prime}+v t^{\prime}\right) \\
t=\gamma\left(t^{\prime}+\frac{v x^{\prime}}{c^{2}}\right)  \tag{2}\\
y=y^{\prime} \\
z=z^{\prime}  \tag{3}\\
\gamma=\frac{1}{\sqrt{1-\frac{v^{2}}{c^{2}}}} \tag{4}
\end{gather*}
$$

Equations (1) and (2) result in the following relativistic velocity transformation equations:

$$
\begin{align*}
u^{\prime} & =\frac{u-v}{1-\frac{u v}{c^{2}}} \\
u & =\frac{u^{\prime}+v}{1+\frac{u^{\prime} v}{c^{2}}} \tag{5}
\end{align*}
$$

Where $c$ is the speed of light propagation in empty space, and $u$ and $u^{\prime}$ are the velocity of a moving body in the $x$-direction, when measured with respect to K and $\mathrm{K}^{\prime}$, respectively.

## Constancy of the Speed of Light

## Equations:

In line with [2], for the inertial frames $K(x, y, z, t)$ and $K^{\prime}\left(x^{\prime}, y^{\prime}, z^{\prime}, t^{\prime}\right)$ in relative motion, the space-time coordinates must obey the light sphere equation transformation:

\begin{gather*}
x^{2}+y^{2}+z^{2}=c^{2} t^{2}  \tag{6}\\
x^{\prime 2}+y^{\prime 2}+z^{\prime 2}=c^{2} t^{\prime 2} \tag{7}
\end{gather*}
$$

Subtracting equation (7) from equation (6), given that the $y$ and $z$ coordinates remain unaltered, we get

$$
\begin{equation*}
x^{2}-x^{\prime 2}=c^{2} t^{2}-c^{2} t^{\prime 2} \tag{8}
\end{equation*}
$$

## Analysis:

Lorentz transformation equations (1) can lead to

$$
\begin{gather*}
x^{\prime 2}=\gamma^{2}\left(x^{2}+v^{2} t^{2}-2 x v t\right)  \tag{9}\\
c^{2} t^{\prime 2}=\gamma^{2}\left(c^{2} t^{2}+\frac{v^{2} x^{2}}{c^{2}}-2 x v t\right) \tag{10}
\end{gather*}
$$

Eliminating the term $2 x v t$ from equations (9) and (10), yields

$$
\begin{equation*}
x^{2}+v^{2} t^{2}-\frac{x^{\prime 2}}{\gamma^{2}}=c^{2} t^{2}+\frac{v^{2} x^{2}}{c^{2}}-\frac{c^{2} t^{\prime 2}}{\gamma^{2}} \tag{11}
\end{equation*}
$$

Similarly, Lorentz transformation equations (2) bring about the following expression;

$$
\begin{equation*}
-x^{\prime 2}-v^{2} t^{\prime 2}+\frac{x^{2}}{\gamma^{2}}=-c^{2} t^{\prime 2}-\frac{v^{2} x^{\prime 2}}{c^{2}}+\frac{c^{2} t^{2}}{\gamma^{2}} \tag{12}
\end{equation*}
$$

Adding equations (11) and $\sqrt[12]]{ }$ will lead to the following expression;

$$
x^{2}\left(1+\frac{1}{\gamma^{2}}\right)-x^{\prime 2}\left(1+\frac{1}{\gamma^{2}}\right)+v^{2}\left(t^{2}-t^{\prime 2}\right)=c^{2} t^{2}\left(1+\frac{1}{\gamma^{2}}\right)-c^{2} t^{\prime 2}\left(1+\frac{1}{\gamma^{2}}\right)+\frac{v^{2}}{c^{2}}\left(x^{2}-x^{\prime 2}\right)
$$

which can be simplified to

$$
\begin{align*}
\left(x^{2}-x^{\prime 2}\right)\left(1+\frac{1}{\gamma^{2}}-\frac{v^{2}}{c^{2}}\right) & =c^{2}\left(t^{2}-t^{\prime 2}\right)\left(1+\frac{1}{\gamma^{2}}-\frac{v^{2}}{c^{2}}\right) \\
\mathbf{x}^{\mathbf{2}}-\mathbf{x}^{\mathbf{2}} & =\mathbf{c}^{\mathbf{2}}\left(\mathbf{t}^{\mathbf{2}}-\mathbf{t}^{\mathbf{2}}\right) \tag{13}
\end{align*}
$$

returning actually the speed of light principle equation 8 ; thus validating equations 113 and 12 from the perspective of the special relativity. It should be noted that equation 8 is obtained from the Lorentz transformation equations without any restriction on the value of $\gamma$ (i.e. $\gamma$ can be replaced in the Lorentz transformation equations by an arbitrary constant, while equation (8) can still be obtained from the invalid resulting equations).
Whereas, the subtraction of equation (12) from equation (11), results in

$$
\left(x^{2}+x^{\prime 2}\right)\left(1-\frac{1}{\gamma^{2}}-\frac{v^{2}}{c^{2}}\right)=c^{2}\left(t^{2}+t^{\prime 2}\right)\left(1-\frac{1}{\gamma^{2}}-\frac{v^{2}}{c^{2}}\right)
$$

Now, if we assume for the time being the following equality (as suggested by the above equation)

$$
\begin{equation*}
x^{2}+x^{\prime 2}=c^{2}\left(t^{2}+t^{\prime 2}\right) \tag{14}
\end{equation*}
$$

then quations 13) and will readily reduce to

$$
\begin{gather*}
\mathbf{x}^{2}=\mathbf{c}^{2} \mathbf{t}^{2}  \tag{15}\\
\mathbf{x}^{\prime 2}=\mathbf{c}^{2} \mathbf{t}^{\prime 2} \tag{16}
\end{gather*}
$$

which satisfy both equations $\sqrt[11]{12}$ and as well as equation $\sqrt{8}$-when $x^{2}$ and $x^{\prime 2}$ are replaced with $c^{2} t^{2}$ and $c^{2} t^{\prime 2}$, respectively-thus validating equation (14) that can also be derived from its consequent equations (15) and (16). Therefore, the verified equation $(14)$ makes equations $(15)$ and $(16)$ the only solution for the constancy of the speed of light equation (8). -It should be noted that equations $(15)$ and $(16)$ can be evidently inferred from equations 113 and 12$)$.

Consequently, the light sphere equations (6) and (7) are collapsed to the line equations (15) and (16):

- When equations (15) and (16) are substituted into equations (6) and (7), they result in the vanishing of $y, z, y^{\prime}$ and $z^{\prime}$.
- This can be reconfirmed by adding equations (6) and (7), and using equation (14).
- First flaw: The constancy of the speed of light equations (6) and (7) are preliminarily restricted to onedimentional light propagation (i.e. $y$ and $z$ coordinates in both frames are forced to be zero), parallel to the direction of the relative motion.

Now, dividing equation (15) by equation (16) yields

$$
\left(\frac{x}{x^{\prime}}\right)^{2}=\left(\frac{c t}{c t^{\prime}}\right)^{2}
$$

or

$$
\begin{equation*}
\frac{x}{x^{\prime}}= \pm \frac{c t}{c t^{\prime}} . \tag{17}
\end{equation*}
$$

For $c>v, x$ and $x^{\prime}$ will always have the same sign (positive or negative)—whether the light beam is emitted in the positive or negative $x$-direction with respect to $K$ and $K^{\prime}$ origins. Therefore,

$$
\frac{x}{x^{\prime}} \geq 0
$$

and given that

$$
\frac{c t}{c t^{\prime}} \geq 0
$$

equation 17 becomes

$$
\begin{equation*}
\frac{x}{x^{\prime}}=\frac{c t}{c t^{\prime}} . \tag{18}
\end{equation*}
$$

Hence, equation (18) combined with equations (15) and (16), leads to

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathbf{c}=\frac{\mathbf{x}}{\mathbf{t}}=\frac{\mathbf{x}^{\prime}}{\mathbf{t}^{\prime}} \tag{19}
\end{equation*}
$$

Outcome: the constancy of the speed of light can be expressed by equation (19).

## The Implication

Assuming the space-time is preserved (i.e. cannot be modified), the coordinates $x$ and $x^{\prime}$ (Fig. 1) would then be related by the following equation with respect to $K$, in accordance with the Galilean transformation;

x^{\prime}=x-v t . \tag{20}
\end{equation*}
$$

Whereas, with respect to $K^{\prime}$, the same coordinates (Fig. 2 ) would be related by the following equation

$$
\begin{equation*}
x=x^{\prime}+v t^{\prime} \tag{21}
\end{equation*}
$$



Fig. 1: $x$-coordinate with respect to $K$.


Fig. 2: $x^{\prime}$-coordinate with respect to $K^{\prime}$.

Substituting equation (20) into equation (21), we get

$$
\begin{equation*}
t=t^{\prime} \tag{22}
\end{equation*}
$$

Dividing both sides of equations (20) and (21) by $c$, and applying the speed of light constancy principle as determined above ( $c=x / t=x^{\prime} / t^{\prime}$ ), the following expressions are obtained;

$$
\begin{align*}
& t^{\prime}=t-\frac{v x}{c^{2}}  \tag{23}\\
& t=t^{\prime}+\frac{v x^{\prime}}{c^{2}} \tag{24}
\end{align*}
$$

Substituting equation (23) in equation (24), we get

$$
\begin{equation*}
x=x^{\prime} . \tag{25}
\end{equation*}
$$

Using equations (22) and 25, we can replace $t^{\prime}$ with $t$, and $x^{\prime}$ with $x$ in equations 23 and , to obtain the following contradiction,

$$
x=-x,
$$

or

$$
1=-1
$$

indicating the set of equations (20), 21), (23) and (24), resulting from the principle of the constancy of the speed of light, yield an impossible solution, generating an imaginary space-time. Thus the constancy of the light speed principle is unviable, at least in the case of no space-time distorting transformation.

On the other hand, although equations (20), (21), 23) and (24), result in mathematical impossibility, they generate the constancy of the speed of light equation (8) - that eqaully leads to these invalid equations, as shown above.

- Second flaw: The speed of light constancy principle is merely a mathematical impossibility.

In fact, equations 20 and 23 lead to

$$
x^{\prime 2}=x^{2}+v^{2} t^{2}-2 x v t
$$

and

$$
c^{2} t^{\prime 2}=c^{2} t^{2}+\frac{v^{2} x^{2}}{c^{2}}-2 x v t
$$

Eliminating $2 x u t$ from the above two equations yields

$$
\begin{equation*}
x^{2}+v^{2} t^{2}-x^{\prime 2}=c^{2} t^{2}+\frac{v^{2} x^{2}}{c^{2}}-c^{2} t^{\prime 2} \tag{26}
\end{equation*}
$$

Similarly, equations 21) and 24 can lead to

$$
\begin{equation*}
-x^{\prime 2}-v^{2} t^{\prime 2}+x^{2}=-c^{2} t^{\prime 2}-\frac{v^{2} x^{\prime 2}}{c^{2}}+c^{2} t^{2} \tag{27}
\end{equation*}
$$

Adding equations (26) and (27), returns equation (8):

$$
x^{2}-x^{\prime 2}=c^{2} t^{2}-c^{2} t^{\prime 2}
$$

Indeed, the addition of equations 26 and 27 results in the following expressions,

$$
\begin{gathered}
2\left(x^{2}-x^{\prime 2}\right)+v^{2}\left(t^{2}-t^{\prime 2}\right)=2 c^{2}\left(t^{2}-t^{\prime 2}\right)+\frac{v^{2}}{c^{2}}\left(x^{2}-x^{\prime 2}\right) \\
\left(x^{2}-x^{\prime 2}\right)\left(2-\frac{v^{2}}{c^{2}}\right)=c^{2}\left(t^{2}-t^{\prime 2}\right)\left(2-\frac{v^{2}}{c^{2}}\right)
\end{gathered}
$$

yielding the speed of light constancy principle equation,

$$
x^{2}-x^{\prime 2}=c^{2}\left(t^{2}-t^{\prime 2}\right)
$$

Further, equations (20), 21, (23) and (24), resulting in mathematical impossibility, also generate the relativistic velocity equations (5) - by dividing equation (20) by equation (23), and equation (21) by equation (24) - and working back from equations (5), equations (20), (21), (23) and (24) can be deduced.

- Third flaw: The Lorentz velocity transformation equations are merely invalid velocity criteria of the speed of light constancy principle.


## Lorenz Transformation Re-derivation

Owing to equation $\sqrt{19)}$, the derivation of the Lorentz Transformation is substantially simplified:

- Assuming a space-time distorting transformation, a length conversion by a factor of $\beta$ (a positive real number) along the direction of motion is hypothesized.
-This length conversion can therefore be expressed using Figs. 1 and 2 as follows.

$$
\begin{gather*}
x=v t+\beta x^{\prime} .  \tag{28}\\
x^{\prime}=-v t^{\prime}+\beta x . \tag{29}
\end{gather*}
$$

Rearrange equations 28 and 29 :

$$
\begin{align*}
& x^{\prime}=\frac{1}{\beta}(x-v t)  \tag{30}\\
& x=\frac{1}{\beta}\left(x^{\prime}+v t^{\prime}\right) \tag{31}
\end{align*}
$$

Divide both sides of equations (30) and (31) by $c$, and apply the speed of light constancy principle equation 19):

$$
\begin{align*}
& t^{\prime}=\frac{1}{\beta}\left(t-\frac{v x}{c^{2}}\right)  \tag{32}\\
& t=\frac{1}{\beta}\left(t^{\prime}+\frac{v x^{\prime}}{c^{2}}\right) . \tag{33}
\end{align*}
$$

Solving equations (30), (31), (32) and (33) for $\beta$ results in

$$
\beta=\sqrt{1-\frac{v^{2}}{c^{2}}}
$$

or

$$
\begin{equation*}
\frac{1}{\beta}=\frac{1}{\sqrt{1-\frac{v^{2}}{c^{2}}}}=\gamma \tag{34}
\end{equation*}
$$

In fact, for $x^{\prime}=0$, equations (30) and (33) yield $x=v t$, and $t^{\prime}=\beta t$, respectively, reducing equation (32) to

$$
\beta t=\frac{1}{\beta}\left(t-\frac{v^{2} t}{c^{2}}\right)
$$

therefore

$$
\beta=\sqrt{1-\frac{v^{2}}{c^{2}}}
$$

Conversely, for $x=0$, equations (31) and (32) yield $x^{\prime}=-v t$, and $t=\beta t^{\prime}$, respectively, reducing equation (33) to

$$
\beta t^{\prime}=\frac{1}{\beta}\left(t^{\prime}-\frac{v^{2} t^{\prime}}{c^{2}}\right)
$$

hence

$$
\beta=\sqrt{1-\frac{v^{2}}{c^{2}}} .
$$

$\beta<1$, then the hypothesized length conversion is a length contraction.
Equations (30), (31), (32), (33), and (34) are the Lorentz transformation.

## Lorentz Transformation Contradictions

For the origin of $K^{\prime}(0,0,0,0)$, the corresponding $K$ coordinates shall satisfy the relation

$$
\frac{x}{t}=\frac{x^{\prime}}{t^{\prime}}=\frac{0}{0}
$$

yielding the set of $K$ coordinates

$$
\left(x=\frac{\mathbf{0}}{\mathbf{0}}, \mathbf{0}, \mathbf{0}, \mathbf{t}=\frac{\mathbf{0}}{\mathbf{0}}\right)
$$

with undetermined $x$ and $t$.

- Fourth flaw: The frames of reference origin-coordinates are undetermined with respect to each other-except for the set coordinates zero value at the initial frames superimposing instant.

Consequently, Lorentz transformation, implicitly incorporating equation (19), results in various conflicts.

- For instance, substituting equation (32) into equation (33), returns

$$
\begin{equation*}
t=\gamma\left(\gamma\left(t-\frac{v x}{c^{2}}\right)+\frac{v x^{\prime}}{c^{2}}\right) \tag{35}
\end{equation*}
$$

Equation (35) is simplified in the following steps.

$$
\begin{gathered}
t=\gamma^{2} t-\frac{\gamma^{2} v x}{c^{2}}+\frac{\gamma v x^{\prime}}{c^{2}} \\
t\left(\gamma^{2}-1\right)=\frac{v x}{c^{2}}\left(\gamma^{2}-\frac{\gamma x^{\prime}}{x}\right)
\end{gathered}
$$

Using equation 19 , in the above equation, we get

$$
\begin{equation*}
t\left(\gamma^{2}-1\right)=\frac{v x}{c^{2}}\left(\gamma^{2}-\frac{\gamma t^{\prime}}{t}\right) . \tag{36}
\end{equation*}
$$

With respect to equation $\sqrt[32]{ }$, for $t^{\prime}=0, t=v x / c^{2}$ (undetermined with respect to equation 19, except at the initial instant, the value is set to zero). Therefore, for $t \neq 0$, equation (36) reduces to

$$
t\left(\gamma^{2}-1\right)=t \gamma^{2}
$$

yielding the contradiction,

$$
\gamma^{2}-1=\gamma^{2}
$$

or

$$
\mathbf{0}=\mathbf{1} .
$$

Similar contradiction is obtained by substituting equation (33) into equation (32), using equation (19) in the resulting equation, and applying equation 33 for $t=0\left(t^{\prime}=-v x^{\prime} / c^{2}\right)$.

- Furthermore, substituting equation (30) into equation 31, yields

$$
\begin{align*}
& x=\gamma\left(\gamma(x-v t)+v t^{\prime}\right) \\
& x\left(\gamma^{2}-1\right)=\gamma v\left(\gamma t-t^{\prime}\right) \\
& x\left(\gamma^{2}-1\right)=\gamma v t\left(\gamma-\frac{t^{\prime}}{t}\right) . \tag{37}
\end{align*}
$$

Using equation 19 in equation (37, we get,

$$
\begin{equation*}
x\left(\gamma^{2}-1\right)=\gamma v t\left(\gamma-\frac{x^{\prime}}{x}\right) \tag{38}
\end{equation*}
$$

With respect to equation (30), for $x^{\prime}=0, x=v t$ (undetermined with respect to equation (19), except at the initial instant, the value is set to zero). Therefore, for $x \neq 0$, equation 38 reduces to the following contradiction:

$$
\gamma^{2}-1=\gamma^{2},
$$

or

$$
\mathbf{0}=\mathbf{1}
$$

Similar contradiction would follow upon substituting equation (31) into equation (30), using equation (19), and applying equation 31 for $x=0, x^{\prime}=-v t^{\prime}$.

- Fifth flaw: Lorentz Transformation generates mathematical impossibilities.

It follows that, the Lorentz transformation is deemed to be refuted.
The Lorentz transformation obtained contradictions are indeed expected, as it derives the constancy of the speed of light equation (8) that has been demonstrated to be mathematically impossible.

## Conclusion

Analysis of the Lorentz transformation revealed mathematical restrictions in terms of the deduced, simplified form of the constancy of the speed of light equations residing in the transformation. The Lorentz transformation, readily reconstructed using these basic, restricted light velocity invariance equations, resulted in mathematical contradictions. The principle of the constancy of the speed of light was thus demonstrated to be an unviable assumption, and the ensuing Lorentz transformation was subject to refutation.

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
