

## Children of Dune Etc

I'm watching that movie now "with" my daughter Hope. [She's presently 1.5 years old; "with" means when she's 8; I'm recording my side of the conversation right now, as I type.] Long story short, my fictional counterpart is Muad'Dib, Hope's Ghanima, and her brother Arthur, Leto.
